2	Learning the development of the history of political thought through the basic concepts and sources.
3	Making an analysis of the history of political thought with a contemporary point of view; examining the ancient and middle age European history with the Reform and Renaissance movements and the development of Turkish history of political thought, and the political thoughts of the 20th century and the development of the new world order.
4	The accumulation of concepts and frameworks of Turkish political thought with political treatises, reform pamphlets and political movements of modernisation is explained.
5	The concept of politics is explained with reference to institutions and significant figures.
